Landing on Juno Beach, The Royal Winnipeg Rifles were an integral part of Operation Neptune, the largest seaborne invasion in history; D-Day was the start of the invasion of German occupied Northern Europe, marking the beginning of the end of the Second World War.

2014 marks the 70th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings. The Regiment sent Sergeant Tyson Burch and Corporal Josh Barker as part of the official contingent for the ceremony in Normandy. Several members of the Association made the trip to attend

ceremonies in and around the Normandy Region of France.
